12 slices white bread (cubed)

HORTICULTURE

A Master Gardener's Pruning Philosophy

Abandoning his dream of becoming a physician, Ezio Etow learned all about plants while growing vegetables in an internment camp during WWII. The following is his pruning method and philosophy. All references to 'plant' apply to both trees and shrubs.

"The biggest threat to plants isn't pests, disease or draught.

It's the gardener."

Become acquainted with your subject: study its natural form. The back of a plant needs attention, too. Careless cuts can take years to correct, if ever.

Before you start cutting WITH CLEAN SNIPPERS, examine the specimen for dead, broken, malformed, crowded, crossed limbs/branches/twigs, all which should be cut away. To avoid cutting away a good limb, use bright nylon twine to identify those that need pruning.

"Leave your ego outside the garden."

Making that first cut: position clippers 1/4" from the main trunk or main branch and make a traversal cut across area to be cut away (do not cut on an angle, angle cuts are LARGER and expose MORE SURFACE which could increase chance of DISEASE).

First remove obvious suckers and any other branch that can drain the energy out of the plant. Make sure to cut above nodes/buds so they face upward and outward. (Inward growing branches are formed when one willy-nilly cuts below an inward growing node/bud.) Never prune away any more than 15% of any plant. Plants need leaves for photosynthesis (plants process sunlight to synthesize foods from carbon dioxide and water and generates oxygen as a by-product).

After you make the first cut, step back (much like a painter at the easel) and check the 'balance' of plant before moving to the next limb.

Prune after a plant's blooms are spent or after fruits have been harvested. Of

course, prune any time there's obvious damage to a limb to eliminate an obvious path of disease from entering the plant.

Wait a couple weeks before fertilizing. Apply a balanced fertilizer around the drip line, not near the trunk. No matter how mild a fertilizer may be, dilute all formulas with a ratio of (1) part fertilizer to (2) parts water. It's better to feed rather than fertilize. Use organics whenever possible but remember that too much of a good thing can also harm instead of help.

Start young plants off on the right 'foot' to ensure both a pleasing and correct form as it matures. A well-pruned young plant will eliminate tangles and mish-mash as it developed and make future pruning a snap.

Put as much thought into pruning as you would in selecting a new hairstyle…we can all relate to that.

Follow Mr. Etow's footsteps and you can prune anything.

2013-2014 HORTICULTURE SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS






Below: Hand painted platters from the 1800's and signed by the artist brought by Kay Berg.




MAY PROGRAM
